Drum Corps formed

The newest contender in the Junior Drum Corps World was formed three weeks ago in Etobicoke.

Sponsored by a group of 50 parents, the Etobicoke Crusaders has 50 experienced members and 30 new recruits. All equipment, instructions and uniforms are free, and the only charge is a registration fee of \$3 for each member or \$4 per family.

Leo Doyle, former director of

the old St. Mary's Drum Corps, brings 30 years experience as the Corps director. A staff of instructors and equipment managers are also involved in the training.

The parent sponsors are incorporating with a special committee of businessmen in order to provide a corps which can be perpetuated in the borough. They are also negotiating to provide other

sponsors.

New recruits—12 to 20 year old—including both boys and girls are invited to attend practice sessions to get more details. Experience is not necessary to join.

The Corps practices Wednesday nights from 7 to 9 at St. Georges Public Schools and from 1 to 4 p.m. Sundays at Etobicoke Collegiate.
